Land	Rocky, hilly, heavily forested--took a lot of work to clear and grow on cold, long winters, short summers--short growing seasons (people needed to be very industrious)	fertile, flat, river deltas--vast expanses of easily farmed land
Climate	Small family farms, community oriented	Long summers, short mild winters--long growing season (people could make a fortune with enough help)
Industry	Puritans	large plantations, indentured servants/slave labor
Religion	Pious, industrious people--religion above all	Church of England
Attitude	first public schools (wanted population to be educated in Bible)	Cavalier--leisure and cultural pursuits
Education		Civic minded, responsible
		private European tutors (learn for the cultural aspect)
